NHS inductions at Hammonton High School

The desk staff is friendly and the technicians running the tests are warm yet professional. Once again confirming my belief that everything is better in Hammonton.

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Often in the Peanuts comic, Snoopy would be drawn sitting on top of his doghouse typing diligently on a typewriter. His story always began, "It was a dark and stormy night." Instantly, you know an adventure was afoot. Sinister activity, perhaps horrifying suspense awaited the reader.

Last Saturday night was not stormy, but it was a dark and drizzly night. My son Josh brought little Everett over for me to watch as he headed out into our woods with his bow, hoping to get a deer to fill his freezer.

After an hour of Legos and Scooby-Doo Doo the phone rang. Surprised to hear Josh's voice, I heard, "Mom, you wanna come help me track a deer?" So, what do all good mothers do when their child asks for help? I pulled on my boots, searched for a flashlight and headed out to find him in the 100 acres behind my house. We had a difficult time seeing the drops of blood on the decaying leaves and walked together for a while, then split up. For hours we followed the trail upland toward the street, lost it, found the blood again, followed it into the swamp and back toward the street. No luck.

It was getting late. Suddenly as I walked too close to an unknown house a guy yelled out a window wanting to know what I was doing. What was I doing? I wondered the same thing. 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Learning loss during COVID-19 has been staggering. According to a New Jersey study funded by the New Jersey Children's Foundation, the report relies on test scores from 15 districts and charter schools. It focuses on just over 8,200 students within that group whose scores the researchers considered reliable.


Looking at a sample of students in grades three through eight, the analysis found that students saw about 70 percent as much learning growth in English and about 64 percent of expected progress in math during shutdowns as they would have during that period in a typical year. Black, Hispanic and economically disadvantaged students saw less growth than their peers in both subjects.

OK, that should be a wakeup call to school districts, but it seems it is not as important as teaching gender studies, extreme climate change advocacy and the dangers of white privilege. All brainwashing in my opinion.

I began to wonder how much I tried to instill my beliefs in my students at the Hammonton Middle School as I taught sixth grade for 15 years. After much thought I realized that I was overzealous about the evils of littering and the waste of natural resources as I taught science. 

Entertainment in Hammonton at the turn of the 20th Century was alive and well. Musicals, plays, band concerts, school and church recitals were all popular forms of entertainment starting as early as the 1860's. Movies were first shown in tents around 1907, and one such tent eventually led to the construction of the Eagle Theatre in 1914. The object shown is a well-worn tambourine. The instrument is said to have been used by the Hotel Royal Minstrels in 1898. Although not easily visible in the picture, many names are autographed on the instrument including Jennie and Him Gillingham, Charles W. Layer, Charles Schull, to name only a few. William Mahon wrote a comprehensive chapter in his book, *Story of Hammonton*, including many details of shows, concerts,

actors and actresses. This book is out of print; however, is available for viewing at the Historical Society of Hammonton Museum, along with memorabilia from theater productions, band concerts, etc. Come visit! Museum hours: Tuesdays 10 a.m.-noon, Saturdays 11 a.m.- 2 p.m.


